

Born into a Newton upon Derwent family on 21st June 1882, Harry Wood won both the Military Medal and Victoria Cross for two acts of exceptional gallantry in the closing weeks of the war\*. He returned home a hero and was chosen, as one of Britain's bravest men, to be part of the guard of honour for the burial of the unknown warrior in Westminster Abbey in 1920. Harry died on 15<sup>th</sup> August 1924 at Bristol Mental Hospital, following a minor car incident in Devon that caused him trauma. He is buried at Arnos Vale Commonwealth Graves site in Bristol. Harry was the only person in the East Riding of Yorkshire to receive a Victoria Cross.

One of our residents, Mrs Horsley, heard about a Government campaign to honour all Victoria Cross recipients from the First World War, by laying commemorative paving stones on the 100th anniversary of their awards. After providing information that Harry was born in Newton upon Derwent the village was excited to hear that they had successfully applied for and would receive a government commemorative paving stone.



The Parish Council, as support to the Local History Group, commissioned a plinth and arranged for a matching paver with more detailed information and a picture of Harry to be placed alongside the Govt. paver. The Local History Group, led by Mrs Horsley, set about collating all the information they could find about Harry and produced some banners on his life.
